

Band Program

Students in grade six have been exploring various instruments during music class at NCI. Has your child come home talking about being good at the flute or clarinet ...or loving the trumpet or trombone? Are they talking about signing up for Band?

The grade seven Band program is set up in the school schedule so that all students are able to participate. Throughout the school year,





If a student chooses not to participate in the Band program, they will not be able to enter in grades eight to twelve. Please note that <u>students opting out of the Band program will automatically be enrolled in an alternate program that will include Art, Digital Literacy, Guitar and Photography</u>. Students will experience all four of these subjects in blocks of ten weeks.

This year, students in the art stream went on to a course called Futures in Business and then Start Your Own Business. With the opening of the new high school this fall, changes could be on the horizon so please stay tuned for more information on courses!

The following is current information shared by parents and the music teacher in order to inform parents of the decision that will need to be made and commitments that will be considered.

Cost for Rental/Ownership

- St. John's Music Trombone example: Purchased new: \$400-\$800, used \$275-\$600; will ship (no charge) instrument to the student during summer vacation
- If a student switches instruments mid-year, a new contract is formed and monies paid is <u>not</u> transferable to the next kind of instrument.
- Rental agreement and payments continue through the summer months (practice through summer)
- Other items that might need to be added on are a music stand, oil or cleaning kit (\$20 extra)

Maintenance and Insurance Plan

- \$5.00/month in addition to the instrument rental; cleaning for a student-owned instrument ~\$70

Fundraising

- \$20 Discount Card sales October Mom's Pantry Chocolates January
- Fundraising is available to all students 7-12 as it helps to subsidize the costs for band trips (Gr. 9 is to Moosejaw for \$400 and the Senior trip every other year is around \$600)

Band Clothing/Attire:

- All band students must wear black on the bottom and a black band shirt (additional \$16)

Band Performances

- Attendance is part of their final mark; Three each year: December Christmas Concert, February

Optimist Festival at the Convention Centre and Spring Concert in May

Gr. 6 Band Instrument Selection Evening Dates:

May 21 and 22, 2019 4:00PM - 7:00 PM Location: NCI Band Room (By Appointment, call before April 30th)

New High School Update:

Following a review of applications, the Hanover School Division board has awarded the position of Niverville High School vice-principal to Graham Sereda, a senior years teacher at Niverville Collegiate Institute (NCI). Sereda will work alongside the recently appointed principal, Kimberly Funk.

"I put my name forward because I thought it was such an exciting opportunity to basically lead a brand-new school and to set a new culture," says Sereda. "And even just to re-examine assumptions in education, like, '[How] do we assume a school should run?' So I'm super excited that we have this chance to look at things and say, 'Is this the best way?""

Since he learned of his appointment on March 5, Sereda has met with Funk and is looking forward to upcoming conversations regarding enhancements they can make to student learning and staff culture. After their initial meeting, he's confident they'll complement each other in their roles. He believes that one of the reasons he was awarded the position was due to the way his educational philosophies line up with hers.

"We are very much in alignment with our priorities for the school and so I'm really excited to work together with her," Sereda adds. The duties of vice-principal will only fill part of his time. The balance of his time at the Niverville High School will be determined before the new school year begins this coming fall.

Sereda began his teaching career at NCI in 2010. In 2013, he became the lead teacher for the school's science department and later began assisting in the Turning Point Learning Program, an alternative education initiative introduced at the school a number of years earlier. The program caters to Grades 11 and 12 students who Sereda describes as "academically capable but disengaged for one reason or another." The program focuses less on classroom time and more on community building and internships at local businesses for hands-on learning experiences.


Sereda, a St. Vital resident, says that he's grown to love small-town life since teaching in Niverville. He doesn't discount the idea of a move to the community in his family's future. "I went to a big urban high school [as a teen] and so it was really neat coming here and teaching in a small rural school," muses Sereda. "Just to see the differences between the types of schools, I found that I love this setting. At grad time, for every single kid that walks across the stage, I know something about them. I might even know their families... so I really like that."

Officially, Sereda's new position doesn't begin until September, which gives him plenty of time to consider his dreams for the new school. "This is a really great step for the town, I think," he says. "I'd really like this school to be more than just a school. I'd love it to be more than just a place where kids go because they're legally mandated to. I want it to be a place where kids want to go and want to spend time."

Green Space at NMS

Volunteer parent Lyndsay Eidse, Active Learning and Green Space committee chair, shared these vision boards at the PAC Kiosk as a visual guides for parents to keep the conversation going about what the playground of NMS could evolve to include.



Superintendent Randy Dueck confirmed that Hanover School Division, like all other school divisions in Manitoba, does not receive any funding from the Province (Public Schools Finance Board) for areas outside of the physical school building. Hanover School Division does, however, grant outdoor learning projects \$2,500 upon application by the school once project plans are in place.

This leaves non-profit organizations like PAC responsible for applying for grants and fundraising to provide outdoor learning spaces that contribute to healthy and active lifestyles for our children while they are at school. Plans can include developmentally and age appropriate play pieces or landscaping that will encourage increased movement and socialization. We can think outside the box, beyond play structures, to sports equipment, seating & shady areas to climbing frames or walls.

It is our hope to work with our School Trustees to look into this funding gap. Further conversations with our provincial representatives will also need to take place if progress is to be made like in Alberta where they grant \$250,000 towards new playgrounds.


